The Flint & Genesee Literacy Network currently consists of a variety of community stakeholder organizations, and has launched an ongoing collaboration to align and improve literacy resources and services in Flint and Genesee County. The central idea of the Network is that solving the basic skills challenges requires new approaches to improving basic skills. In line with the strategic components of the recently adopted City of Flint Master Plan, the Network is committed to building on the strengths of community organizations, as well as ensuring that individuals needing to improve their literacy skills have access to sufficient and appropriate information.

OUR DEFINITION OF LITERACY

“An individual's ability to read, write, speak in English, compute and solve problems at levels of proficiency necessary to function on the job, in the family of the individual and in society.”

- Workforce Investment Act, 1998

The Issue

Genesee County is challenged by a silent crisis: up to 10%¹ of adult residents live with low literacy skills. Many are unable to use a bus schedule effectively, calculate change at a restaurant, complete a job application, or read the information on a prescription bottle. This crisis severely limits the region's potential for future growth and prosperity. Parents with limited skills are less able to assist their children and a cycle of intergenerational low literacy is perpetuated. A brief highlight of the crisis includes:

- 99% of early education providers are rated below top quality in the State of Michigan's quality rating program
- 29% of 4th graders are below the State of Michigan's standard in Reading

- 72% of 8th graders are below the State of Michigan's standard in Math
- 23% of high school freshman do not graduate with their class
- 11% of adults do not have a high school diploma
- 5 of the 7 most common occupations in Michigan have a median wage that will not bring a family of four out of poverty

Flint & Genesee Literacy Network is joining more than 120 literacy coalitions across the nation that are working to raise their community's literacy levels and address these issues.

BACKGROUND & BEST PRACTICES

The link between low literacy and incarceration is well established:

- Michigan's economy would see a combination of crime-related savings and additional revenue of about \$280 million each year if the male high school graduation rate increased by just 5%.¹
- A one-year increase in average education levels would reduce arrest rates by 11%.²
- More than 60% of all state and federal corrections inmates can barely read and write.³
- A total of 70% of prisoners scored in the two lowest literacy levels of the National Adult Literacy Survey.⁴
- More than 45% of all inmates in local jails, 40% in state facilities and 27% in federal corrections institutions did not graduate from high school. Inmates ages 24 and younger are less educated.⁵
